## Aims

Learning Outcomes To provide students with the knowledge, skills and mind-set to manage their career and professional development throughout their lifetime, in the context of a dynamic 21st century employment market. Specifically, students will develop the knowledge, skills, motivation and insight to:

- proactively identify, create and explore relevant career and work placement opportunities and take informed decisions (career management);
